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Yajnavalkya Smriti With Original Sanskrit

The Yajnavalkya Smriti (IAST: Yājñavalkya Smṛti) is one of the many Dharma -related texts of Hinduism composed in Sanskrit. It is dated to between the 3rd to 5th-century CE, and belongs to the Dharmasastras tradition. The text was composed after the Manusmriti, but like it and Naradasmriti, the text was composed in shloka (poetic meter) style.

Next to Manu's Institutes of Sacred Law, the Smriti of Yajnavalkya is the important. It contains 1010 slokas or stanzas; and is divided into three Adhyayas; or books, namely Achara or ecclesiastical and moral code; Vyavahara or the civil law and Prayachitta (Penance) or the penal code. Each part or Adhyaya contains the following number of stanzas.
